



Solar power generation cannot be pushed forward

President Donald Trump on Wednesday said his administration will not approve solar or wind power projects, even as electricity demand is outpacing the supply in some parts of the U.S.

Unsubsidized wind and solar power have been the cheapest forms of newly-built energy for the past decade, according to the global financial services firm Lazard.
